GRANT OUTLINE

Nunyarra has been successful in securing a small amount of funding to support a limited amount of organisations in Whyalla to apply for, organise and facilitate their own NAIDOC week activities to be held in Whyalla, from Sunday 6th to Sunday 13th July 2014.

Organisations wishing to apply for the funding will need to complete the short application form in full and submit to Nunyarra before the closing date of **5.00pm Friday 13th June 2014**. All applications will be reviewed against criteria pertaining to:

- A realistic budget
- Value for money (for the amount of people participating)
- how the event will strengthen the local community and help build social inclusion and community participation
- Does the activity enable people to celebrate Indigenous culture
- Does the activity provide opportunities for people who otherwise have difficulties accessing opportunities to celebrate Indigenous culture? aged care facilities, remote communities, socially isolated people
- Positive media exposure of the event

Applications for funding up to **\$500.00 will be considered**. Only one grant application per organisation will be accepted and considered.

Organisations will need to provide: banking and EFT details, ABN, contact person, all tax invoices and an acquittal statement, and an evaluation by **31st July 2014**.

Organisations will be required to submit details of the activity, and date being held, to Nunyarra to be included in the calendar of events.

What is NAIDOC?

NAIDOC stands for National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee. Its origins can be traced to the emergence of Aboriginal groups in the 1920's which sought to increase awareness in the wider community of the status and treatment of Indigenous Australians.

NAIDOC Week celebrations are held across Australia in the first full week of July to **celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples**. NAIDOC is celebrated not only in Indigenous communities but by Australians from all walks of life. The week is a great opportunity to participate in a range of activities and to support your local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community.

It is a time to celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and is an opportunity to ***recognise the contributions that Indigenous Australians make to our country and our society.***

The National NAIDOC theme for 2014 is **Serving Country: Centenary & Beyond**.
